

## **Cantigny Park Offers Civil War Activities October 6 & 7**

*15<sup>th</sup> Annual Civil War Symposium at First Division Museum on Oct. 6 (registration required, fee applies);*

*FREE outdoor activities October 6 & 7 include “living history” actors, Civil War encampment, artillery demos, mock battles and musical/theatrical performances*

**WHEATON, IL, September 28, 2012** — The First Division Museum and Cantigny Park are the places to be for Civil War history buffs, educators and curious onlookers the weekend of October 6-7.

More than 100 attendees, primarily history teachers, are expected at the 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Civil War Symposium hosted with the [National Archives Great Lakes Region](#) on Saturday, October 6, from 9 am to 5 pm.

Presentations will include:

- The 1862 Shenandoah Valley Campaign: Abraham Lincoln and the Union Defeat  
Peter Cozzens, U. S. Department of State
- A Second Front: Women of the Civil War North  
Judith Ann Giesberg, Villanova University
- Lincoln, Emancipation and the McClellan Problem  
Richard S. Slotkin, Wesleyan University
- Difficult and Broken Ground: The Terrain Factor at Shiloh  
Timothy B. Smith, University of Tennessee at Martin

The one-day symposium is open to the general public but advance registration is required. Special rates are available for teachers, students, senior citizens, veterans and active-duty military.

Civil War “living history” re-enactors portraying soldiers and civilians will camp at Cantigny during the weekend. Abraham Lincoln, Mary Todd Lincoln and Harriet Tubman will perform outside the First Division Museum on Saturday, and spectators can witness artillery demonstrations, infantry drills and skirmishes on the Cantigny Parade Field both days. A battlefield surgeon will perform at the camp’s hospital tent (caution: not for the faint of heart!). Visitors also can listen to The Battlefield Balladeers perform songs from the Civil War era.

Outdoor events and activities are free of charge with paid parking (\$5 per vehicle). Participation fees apply only to the Civil War Symposium inside the First Division Museum.
